

JULY

JA Alumni helped at our **Annual Thank-a-thon** by calling and thanking donors. Our supporters love hearing from JA students and students gain essential soft skills sought after by employers.





OCTOBER

Over 100 golfers enjoyed JA NorCal's **Annual Golf Classic**, presented by **AT&T** at Half Moon Bay Golf Links. Volunteers and supporters helped raise \$120,000 for JA programming.

In partnership with **Align Technology**, we hosted a **STEM Career Summit** at their San Jose campus. Students were inspired to pursue STEM education by experiencing Align's campus, innovative products, and hearing about employees' career journeys.

NOVEMBER

The **County of Monterey** continued its longstanding support of JA and our Central Coast students hosting an Agriculture Careers class from Watsonville High. Students explored careers in Agriculture and the public sector, toured the County offices and Board chambers, and learned about internship opportunities.





DECEMBER

FEBRUARY

The inaugural **FinTech Week** was a remarkable series of two Summits hosted at **Block Inc. and Franklin Templeton** that provided unique educational experiences to over 170 students from Oakland, San Francisco, and San Mateo. Through interactive activities, demonstrations, and presentations from industry experts, participants were provided with a comprehensive understanding of the latest technologies related to financial services.

MARCH

STEM Summits impacted 2,211 students throughout San Francisco and the East and South Bays. Attendees benefited from panel discussions, workshops, and speed mentoring. See more on page 12. WORK READINESS

OVER 2,000 STUDENTS ATTENDED JA STEM MONTH

Junior Achievement's proven programs are shown to inspire and prepare young people for success. Our approach is demonstrated to give students the tools they need to increase their chance of achieving their potential in work, career, and life.

After JA's STEM Summit, 89% of students surveyed said that they are more likely to consider a career in STEM. One student shared:

"I learned that tech-related jobs are not just coding and not all are very difficult. There is a much wider variety of jobs in the STEM field than I expected."

In a 2022 JA Alumni survey:

- 84% of JA Alumni report JA positively influenced their decision to pursue higher education.
- 88% of JA Alumni say participating in JA made them think of new career paths.
- 80% of JA Alumni report their careers are extremely fulfilling.
- 73% of JA Alumni currently work in a career they studied in college vs. 27% of the general public.
- 69% of JA Alumni say they work in their dream career vs 25% of the general public.

JA of Northern California's 2023 STEM Summit impacted 2,211 students, with 62 workshops and three mentoring sessions. An additional 5,835 students experienced career readiness programming during the month of March.

FINANCIAL LITERACY

JA IMPROVES FINANCIAL CAPABILITY

JA's financial literacy curricula teaches youth about earning, budgeting, saving, and protecting one's personal finances. Overall, 80% of students who participated in JA Finance Park in 2022-23 said that the program motivated them to spend more time considering and exploring potential careers. Further, 87% of students said that making virtual and pretend purchases during the simulation helped them better understand how a budget works.

2022 JA USA ALUMNI SURVEY

Junior Achievement employs a pathways approach to teaching financial literacy to young people, prioritizing socio-economically disadvantaged youth. Our approach gives students the tools to increase their chances of achieving economic security as adults.

- 84% of JA Alumni agree that their Junior Achievement experience helped with their financial literacy.
- 82% of JA Alumni agree they have a strong financial footing.
- 68% of JA Alumni between the ages of 18 and 29 say they are financially independent from their parents. According to the Pew Research Center, 34 percent of Americans in that age range say the same.

JA alumni are also more likely to finish college, find a satisfying job or career, and start a business.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The JA Company Program is our most indepth program, running for several months during the school year. Working with mentors to provide real-world guidance, over 300 high school students were taught practical skills required to conceptualize, capitalize, and manage their own business venture. The program culminates with a regional competition, Shark Tank style, where students pitch their companies to a panel of judges.

JA NorCal teams are eligible to apply to JA USA's National Competition. Out of over 100 chapters of JA in the U.S., JA NorCal has had teams win a coveted spot in the 15-teams-only competition, for the past 5+ years. In 2023, two JA NorCal teams competed at Nationals: SqueaKey Klean and TalkBlox.




